## NorState FCU donates more than \$16,000 to local area Food Pantries

Denise Cote, NorState Marketing Director welcomed volunteers and coordinators and thanked them for their volunteered time and efforts toward keeping local pantries well stocked; collecting food at drop off sites throughout the Valley and delivery of food to families throughout the year. Many volunteers expressed their appreciation for this food drive, stating that without the efforts of these two partners, the supply of food items at the pantries would not be nearly as plentiful.

Certificates of appreciation, along with monetary donations to the individual food pantries, were presented by NorState CEO, David Rossignol.

"The Maine State Ending Hunger Awareness Campaign raised \$375,923.93 in 2009, a new record, stated Rossignol.

NorState was second highest in total funds raised in the state for the Ending Hunger campaign. That is something we all can be very proud of.

Here at NorState, we raised over \$15,500 throughout our six branches in 2009 and an additional \$13,300 value was contributed directly to ending hunger organizations throughout local communities thanks to the collection of non-perishable food items.

NorState will be donating a total of \$16,970 to local food collection organizations today, thanks in part to Maine Credit Union Leagues Ending Hunger campaign, our member's generosity and continued support as well as our continued commitment to this cause."

The Maine Credit Union League grants additional funds to augment local efforts.

"So the more we raise, the more we get back from the League and the more NorState can contribute to local food pantries," added Cote.
